INSTRUCTIONS

The map overlay comes from OpenStreetMap.org. It is open, which means that it can be freely used and edited by anyone - a bit like Wikipedia, but for maps. In the last few days Kate Chapman (Humanitarian OpenStreetMap Team) and Fee Plumley (reallybigroadtrip) have been turning the Boreen Point Camping Ground area (originally an expanse of green) into a more articulate collection of roads and paths.

Much more can be done to improve the data and keep track of changes in the shoreline caused by natural disasters and climate change, and we invite you to help.

- 1. Take one of these maps on a walk around the area.
- 2. Where you see a fixed point of interest draw it on the map as accurately as possible.
- 3. Take a photograph of your annotated map, making sure to include the whole image and QR Code (the black & white grid pattern).
- 4. Upload the photograph to http://fieldpapers.org/upload.php.
- 5. Add your data at OpenStreetMap.org using our computer or you can go to http://learnosm.org/en to do it yourself.
- 6. Visit http://www.openstreetmap.org to see what other areas of the world you can help to improve.
